One of Saskatchewan's last major independent bookstores is closing, saying e-books are partly to blame.

Regina-based Book & Brier Patch says it will close its doors after 33 years.

Over that time, the family-owned business on Albert Street has been the scene of many book launches involving Saskatchewan authors.

But in a news release Tuesday, the store said it's been under relentless pressure from bookstore chains, big box stores and online retailers that have been chipping away at its profits.

Now, cheap electronic books that can be ordered online are becoming popular and the bricks-and-mortar book store is no longer viable, the release said.

The company plans a going-out-of-business sale starting on Wednesday.
